Despite the deep cuts over the past year, our Annual Report showcases not only the sheer volume of work which is ever increasing, but also the diversity of what we do, and for whom. This has been an especially difficult year for the community sector and COSTA alike, of that there is definitely no doubt. Despite this COSTA continues to have devoted staff, Development Manager - Loraine Griffin, but unfortunately, our Finance Officer - Lisa Wright has now left the Network after 15 years of dedicated service due to severe funding cuts. We will also very unfortunately be saying goodbye to all our remaining MARA staff: MARA Project Officer - Clare Davidson and MARA Enablers — Gillian Steenson and Karen Duggan when the MARA Project finally closes down in September. These ladies have worked so tirelessly in their roles to deliver COSTA's services to local rural and isolated communities. On behalf of the Board I would like to say a very heart-felt thank you to you all for your contributions to COSTA over many years and I wish you all the very best for the future!

COSTA would like to acknowledge and thank the Department of Agriculture, Environment & Rural Affairs (DEARA) as they are now known, for their contribution as our major funder and for their leadership role in developing the Tackling Rural Poverty & Social Inclusion Programme (TRPSI). Thanks must also go to the Public Health Agency for funding the Dungannon & Armagh MARA Project in partnership with TADA Rural Support Network. The Maximising Access to services, grants and benefits in Rural Areas project has been shown to significantly improve the health and wellbeing of people living in rural areas throughout Dungannon & Armagh, where the hidden nature of poverty and isolation can make it difficult to connect with the most vulnerable members of our community. It has to be noted that COSTA appreciates the ongoing and invaluable support provided by Mid Ulster District Council, and especially, the four Councilors who sit as Advisors on our Board: Frances Burton, Sharon McAleer, Dominic Molloy and Robert Mulligan. I would like to pass on COSTA's thanks to these Councilors and to MUDC Community Development Manager, Philip Clarke who has been with COSTA from the very start.

Central to all this, COSTA continues to deliver and sustain the Rural Community Development Support Service (RCDSS) throughout the Dungannon and South Tyrone area; sub-contracted under CWSAN as part of the 9 providers of the Rural CDSS. Our now very well established partnership with CWSAN, covering Cookstown and Magherafelt, continues to prosper and we look forward to ongoing strong partnership.

As I now finally 'bow out' of COSTA after 16 years and also retire from many years of voluntary community service, I see COSTA continuing very positively into the future despite the current very difficult times for the sector. I hope COSTA will be here for many more years to come and I wish you, and your communities all the very best for the future.

Network Development Manager's Report

Welcome everyone! We celebrate our 16th year in a more muted tone perhaps than usual. This year has been by far one of the hardest ever for the Network and indeed the wider voluntary community sector to date with austerity cuts taking effect, sweeping changes and extreme uncertainly ahead.

However 2016 sees very successful completion of the 4th year of the current DAERA-funded Rural Community Development Support Service (RCDSS) across Mid Ulster in partnership with CWSAN. Despite swinging cuts this year, the Network has delivered over 28 Workshops to 460 participants and over 310 supports to the local community. We have actively engaged with over 150 local groups and communities face-to-face and our key outputs can be viewed on pages 7 - 15 of this Report.

We have already seen the successful delivery of Phases 1 and 2 of the DARD Rural Micro Capital Grants Scheme since May of last year. More recently under Phase 2, in total 42 grants were awarded across the Mid Ulster area with around 20 of those from the COSTA area. We are awaiting confirmation of the future of the scheme as it has been hugely successful to date, and we hope that there will be future programmes perhaps from September 2016.

As ever, I extend my sincere thanks – but unfortunately this year also a very fond farewell - to several COSTA staff: my RCDSS colleague of 15 years Lisa Wright, and our MARA staff: Clare Davidson, Gillian Steenson and Karen Duggan for such an excellent achievement in delivering the MARA Project in conjunction with TADA. Thank you all sincerely for all your hard work, I hope you have enjoyed your time at COSTA, and I wish you all the very best for the future. I must also thank Elaine Murphy and Keelin McGartland for standing in, helping out, and for doing such a fantastic job this year.

Thank you sincerely to all the COSTA Board for their unwavering dedication and hard work on may sub-groups throughout the year particularly from Richard Knox, Heather McLaughlin, Anthony McGonnell, Raymond Harrison, John Burrell and Wilfred Mitchell. The Board has had to make many very tough decisions in light of very significant funding cuts, all credit to the Board, they have shown great courage, tenacity and leadership in ensuring COSTA's survival. I do believe the truly difficult work is now behind us and we can look forward to a more positive future. At this point, I really want take this opportunity to mention 3 Board members who have served on COSTA's Board for the last 15+ years and have given so many years of dedicated service – firstly our Chairperson of the last 2 years Helen O'Donnell who has a very light and pragmatic approach to everything, also our previous Chairperson Liz Salter (3 years), and our Chairperson prior to that, Mary O'Neill (7 years). These 3 ladies have given an amazing contribution to not only COSTA, but the wider voluntary community sector, for many years and wearing many different hats. We are so grateful for their dedication, and it has been an absolute honour for me as Manager to have worked with them over so many years.



From 1 April 2015, the new Mid Ulster District Council assumed responsibilities for the services provided by the Legacy Councils of Cookstown District, Magherafelt District and Dungannon & South Tyrone Borough.



COSTA 'Open Door Days'

Throughout the year over 24 groups have accessed 5 Open Door Days held once nearly every two months by COSTA. The Open Door Days provide COSTA members and local groups with access to free and confidential support, advice and information on topics such as:

COSTA 'Charity Registration' & 'Charity Annual Returns Information' Workshops

Throughout the year COSTA, as a recognised support organisation, has engaged with 50 groups to comply with the new Charity Commission NI legislation via 4 Workshops and 5 'Open Doors Support Days' held at President Grant's Homestead to provide direct information and support to those 'called forward' to register as Charities. To date over 75 groups have been assisted to complete or submit their Charity Registrations. In line with upcoming demand, COSTA has now developed a new **Charity Annual Returns Workshop** and support service to give local groups the essential guidance and information on how to successfully complete their Annual Returns to the NI Charity Commission.

Mid Ulster Funding Fair

CWSAN and COSTA jointly hosted a Funding Fair for the Mid Ulster District area on Thursday 12 March 2016, 4:00pm – 6:45pm in the Glenavon House Hotel, Cookstown.

At least 70 groups and community representatives from all walks of life attended. Attendees had the opportunity to talk to and spend some quality time with a range of funders to discuss potential opportunities, plans and ideas for the future.



DARD Rural Micro Capital Grant Scheme (DRMCG)

The Rural Micro Capital Grant Scheme is a grant programme funded by DAERA through which rural community groups can apply for funding up to £1,500. It was piloted in May 2015 (Phase 1) and Phase 2 was launched in October 2015. CWSAN and COSTA jointly manage the DRMC Grant Scheme throughout the Mid Ulster District Council area along with the other 9 Network regionally. There has been a huge uptake in the scheme from all manner of local groups wishing to carry out small capital projects. The Programme provides grants funded at up to 85% of the total cost of the project, up to a maximum grant limit of £1,500, and are designed to address local issues of:

- Access Poverty
- Financial Poverty
- Social Isolation

Projects can fall under one or more 3 Key areas:

- Modernisation (of premises / assets)
- Information Communication Technology
- Health & Wellbeing

The Minister of Agriculture and Rural Development (now DAERA), Michelle O'Neill MLA has spoken in the NI Assembly on several occasions about how pleased the Department is with the positive difference these small grants have made to groups, not only in capital value, but in confidence building as many have used the experience of applying through the RMCGS as a stepping stone to apply for further funding from other sources.

ISO 9001

Since May 2009 COSTA and the Rural Support Networks have all successfully, and very proudly, held the internationally recognised ISO 9001:2008 Quality Management Standard for excellence. In our quest to ensure that we are continuously evolving,

adapting and improving all that we do, we are now well on our way to attaining the newly updated standard ISO 9001:2015. The new standard is more applicable and better suited to the Networks and the types of work and services that we deliver. The new standard also carries a much stronger emphasis on the management of risk and organisational sustainability which is particularly relevant at present.

COSTA Strategy for Sustainability



In September 2015, based on a very sound evidence base, COSTA produced a 'Strategy for Sustainability Action Plan' with 3 key areas of focus: (1) LRSN Infrastructure, (2) Positive & Innovative Culture, and (3) Social Economy.

Since then, the Networks have been rocked by serious funding cuts of over 33% in the last year alone, and in order to meet these chal-

lenges, COSTA has implemented a Restructuring Programme. Over the past 5 years in particular, COSTA has very successfully built up a firm foundation and a reserve base – using the 'Prudence Principle' – to ensure we can weather the tough times.

Tackling Rural Poverty

In addition, during the last 5 years over £15,000 of development investment has been levered-in through in-kind contributions to train staff, update skills, promote innovation, and increase organisational capability and sustainability to meet the demands faced by the wider voluntary community sector today. Despite a future that appears to remain new and quite uncertain, we remain very positive and pro-active.

MARA Project - Maximising Access in Rural Areas



In March 2012, DARD and PHA introduced the MARA Project to all rural areas of Northern Ireland. Since this time **COSTA** has delivered MARA home visits to nearly 2,000 households in the rural areas of **Dungannon and Armagh** in partnership with TADA Network - coordinated by Project Officer Clare Davidson.

The overall aim of the project has been to improve the health and wellbeing of people living in rural deprived areas by making them aware

of, or helping them access local services, grants or benefits, thus supporting those rural dwellers living in or at risk of poverty and social exclusion.

Both of COSTA's Enablers – Gillian Steenson and Karen Dougan - visited clients' homes to conduct a needs assessment. MARA used a "personal touch" to encourage people to avail of a range of services, benefits and grants which they would not otherwise have known about or been able to apply for (e.g. Benefit Entitlement Checks (BECs), NI Sustainable Energy Programme (NISEP), Home Safety, Local Services, Rural Community Transport Partnerships (RCTP), Boiler Replacement Grants (NIHE), Occupational Therapy Assessments, Social Services, and Translink Smartpass). Clients are also provided with follow-up support regarding their referrals.

What MARA has Achieved Regionally:

In total, 12,085 homes were visited by enablers across all rural areas of Northern Ireland between May 2012 and December 2014 and there have been additional homes visited since the evaluation has been carried out. In those households, 13,784 individuals were assessed for need. The overall profile for clients included in MARA was as follows: 40% of clients were male and 60% female. The gender breakdown was roughly equivalent across zones. Clients were aged 64 years on average (ranging from 18 to 102 years). Over half (55%) of all clients were 65 years or more. Over half of all clients (57.9%) were retired, less than one fifth (19%) were in employment (full or part time or self-employed) and the majority, 81.7% lived in households that did not contain children under 18 years.

Regional Targets were set for the number of referrals for services, grants and benefits. All regional targets were exceeded except for transport as follows:

- 53% of households referred to Home Improvement Schemes (target 20%).
- 51% of clients were referred for Home Safety Checks (no target set).
- 53% of clients were referred for a Benefits Entitlement Check (35% target).
- 28% were referred for local services (including social / physical activity, education / training activities) (target 20%).
- 18% referred for Universal Services (Social Services and OT) (target 15%).
- 21% were referred for Transport service which included Rural Community Transport or Translink Smartpass (target 25%).
- 90% of all clients were referred for at least one service.
- 69% of clients were referred to more than one service (up to 9 services).
- Over half (55.4%) of all clients achieved a positive outcome from a MARA referral.

MARA has achieved all its targets and yielded success, particularly for older rural people - for every £1 invested MARA yielded £6 for clients. Forecasting over 5 years this increases to a value to clients of £15.52 for every £1 invested. MARA's holistic multiagency offering helps deliver government in a 'joined up' way and its local community approach helps identify and access those most in need.

Successful Outcomes

From the proportion of clients who had successful claims:

- 30% of those referred to home improvement schemes were successful (16% of all households) and had measures carried out to improve the energy efficiency of their home.
- The majority (14%) had a successful Warm Homes or Levy claim and 3% were awarded a Boiler Replacement Grant.
- 77% of those referred to Home Safety were provided with equipment and / or advice from the Home Safety Advisor which equated to 40% of all clients;
- 7% of those referred for BECs were awarded a Benefit which equated to 4% of all clients; the average weekly Benefit amount for successful claimants was £63.74.4
- 39% of those referred to a universal service had a successful outcome which equated to 7% of all clients: 6% all clients had a successful outcome from an Occupational Therapy Assessment and 1% had a successful outcome from a Social Services Assessment);
- 42% of those referred for a Transport referral were successfully registered with a transport provider which equated to 9% of all clients (6% of all clients were registered with RCTP and 3% with Translink). The number of community transport trips taken by MARA clients was 3,966 (reported April 2015).
- 20% of those referred were sent information about a service they were interested in their local area which equated to 6% of all clients.
